#### Offshore Extractions and the Everyday Life of a Refugee Economy in the Republic of Nauru by: Julia Morris

With a catalogue of over 2000 filed incident reports, Nauru's offshore refugee operations were characterized worldwide as an exceptionality, "a dark, wretched Truman Show without the cameras." Julia argues that Nauru is in fact microcosmic of the same industrial hazards that envelop refugee economies elsewhere, putting forward an approach that recognizes the systemic flaws in global refugee operations.

Julia is a Doctoral Candidate in Social Anthropology at the University of Oxford and a research student at Oxford's Centre on Migration, Policy and Society. Her research focuses on the political economy of resource extraction, based on fieldwork on the international refugee industry.

#### Intangible and Archaeological Heritage; the *Pixan* of Santa Elena, Yucatan by: Laura Osorio

The Yucatan peninsula is one of many regions in the world that contains a high density of archaeological sites. The people of Santa Elena, a town in Yucatan, do not benefit greatly from the tourist revenue or international research involved in the development of local archaeological sites. Laura discusses some of the oral narratives of Maya speaking residents of Santa Elena that touch on archaeological sites as material remains of past societies and the perceived relationship between these sites and the cultural landscape. She will look at how heritage is involved in local community discourse and identity politics.

Laura Osorio holds a BA in Archaeology, Classics and Classical Art from University College London and a Masters and PhD in Mesoamerican Heritage and Archaeology from Leiden University. Following the completion of her doctorate she has worked in museum education at the Louvre, has been a curator at The British Museum and is currently the Mellon Postdoctoral Curatorial Fellow for Latin America at MOA.



# Relevance and Application of Heritage in Contemporary Society Toronto, Canada, October 19-23, 2016



Together with a panel of internationally renowned experts, David Pokotylo participated in a workshop at the Royal Ontario Museum, Toronto, from October 19-23, 2016. The workshop was funded by grants from the Wenner-Gren Foundation and the Royal Ontario Museum to explore the roles of cultural heritage in tackling global challenges of climate change, poverty, displacement, armed conflict, and more. Workshop participants produced a list of wide-ranging actions to promote useful tactics for cultural heritage including the use of citizen science, policy guidance for military and intelligence personnel in combat, strengthening the role of indigenous and other communities, and scientific collaborations with climate scientists. A peer-reviewed volume, website, and A Call to Action will be released in 2017.






## Anthropologists search NASA data for migration and land use patterns in the Himalayas

In partnership with a team based at Yale University, UBC researchers Mark Turin and Sara Shneiderman have received \$750,000 USD from NASA to investigate how social change and natural disasters affect patterns of mobility and urbanization in Bhutan, India and Nepal.

They will use satellite images to track land use change and the impact of natural disasters, like earthquakes, fires, floods and landslides. Turin and Shneiderman's role will be to uncover the data's "social story" – providing the cultural, historical and political context for why the data might show shifts in populations in certain areas over time.

#### In Honor of Daniel Brasil

The Department of Anthropology sends its condolences to the friends and family of PhD graduate Daniel Brasil, who recently passed away.

"Daniel Brasil, a recent PhD graduate of our department has recently died. I learned from the Brasilian consulate in Vancouver that he was helping some construction workers and a pillar fell on his head. Daniel completed the first joint PhD in anthropology with UBC and the University of Brasilia. He was a member of the Brasilian diplomatic service. He carried out long term field work with Quilomobo communities of Brasil, the topic of his book *O Mar Virou Sertao*, published in 2014. He also worked for several years with a Yoruban-descended Afro-Cuban community in Matanzas, a small city northeast of Havana, and with First Nations and American Indians of North America. He was engaged in a project of mapping and recording community oral histories with the Afro-Cubans at the time of his death. Daniel greatly enjoyed working in the field and lending his assistance to communities he understood as "underdogs." He used this term to refer to those aware of the subordination they experienced through colonialism yet searching for ways to use the legal and administrative structures of the nation-state to challenge and improve their circumstances.

Daniel was both my former student, shared with Stephen Baines of the University of Brasilia, and my friend. We spent time in the field together on many occasions and enjoyed the hospitality of each other's homes. I use the Brasilian spelling here in honour of Daniel's family name and his country of Brasil."

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
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
