### SOCIAL SCIENCES & BEHAVIOURAL RESEARCH INVOLVING HUMAN PARTICIPANTS


All in-person research has been suspended and the university has curtailed all research activities and creative scholarship on UBC campuses until further notice. No ongoing or new research that requires in-person contact can begin until the University restrictions are lifted. Exceptions may be made in special situations, such as for research related to COVID-19 or if stopping the research has the potential to put participants at risk.

An exemption form can be found on the VPRI website. Researchers may also change their methods to an online medium, so their research can continue during the curtailment.

"What I Did Last Summer: Community Collaboration and Student Fieldwork in Sardinia, 2019"

Abstract:

This presentation chronicles Magliocco's return to "Monteruju" (Bessude), Sardinia, the community where she had done fieldwork in the 1980s, with a group of UBC students in a Go Global seminar in the summer of 2019. Their goal was to study how Sardinian cultural heritage was being (re)presented in a global context. The group were very much aware that they were part of the phenomenon we were exploring. This project was undertaken with the support and cooperation of the community as part of a broader effort to valorize its cultural heritage and obtain regional and EU funds for urban renewal and development. It exemplifies how ethnologists can work cooperatively with communities on educational projects that have wide-ranging benefits for a variety of stakeholders.

Bio:

**Sabina Magliocco**, Ph.D. is Professor of Anthropology and Chair of the interdisciplinary Program in the Study of Religion at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver. A recipient of Guggenheim, National Endowment for the Humanities, SSHRC, Fulbright and Hewlett fellowships, and an honorary Fellow of the American Folklore Society, she has published on religion, folklore, foodways, festival and witchcraft in Europe and the United States, and is a leading authority on the modern Pagan movement. Her current research is on nature, animals and the spiritual imagination.
